## The eCities Project

- Began as the first major study focusing on local economic development by the College of Business
- Annual project to support Michigan communities
- Since 2007, over 200 local governments have participated in eCities
- Use benchmarking metrics to support municipal economic development:
  - Use data from local governments and public sources
  - Quantitative & Qualitative analysis
  - Longitudinal analysis
  - Comparative analysis







### eCities Historical Trends

- Average median income of household remains above state levels
- One-third of communities have economic development employees and façade grants
- Additions to Governmental Assets has returned to 2012 levels


# 2016 Participating Communities

#### 76 Communities from 25 Counties:

- Over 20% of Michigan's Residents
- 28% of the State's College Graduates
- 22% of Michigan's Real Commercial Property
- Over \$2.5 Billion in Total Construction
- Over \$1.4 Billion in Commercial Construction
- Spent over \$2.4 Million on Economic Development
- Over 60% have local business databases
- Over I/3 offer business improvement grants
- Nearly 40% have full-time economic development employees
- Over I/5 of Michigan's Entrepreneurs
- Nearly \$1.9 Billion in Self-Employed Income

# Clustering and Growth

- Over \$29 Billion in total real and personal property
- Over 11,500 building permits issued in the past year

#### **Policies**

- 74% utilize Tax Incremental Finance Authorities
- 74% offer multiple economic development programs
- 70% have local business databases

#### Community

- 68% of their population is over 25 years of age
- Self-employment income is over \$733 Million

#### **Policies**

- Nearly 90% engage in placemaking efforts
- Nearly 95% have shared services

#### Growth

- Over \$1.1 Billion of total construction in value
- 77% of construction is commercial
- \$152 Million total addition to assets in the past year

#### Community

- Average median income is over \$59,000
- 30% of the population has a college degree
